







Emergency Contraception vs. Medication Abortion

What is it?

- Emergency contraception (EC) is a safe medical intervention after having unprotected sex, or a contraceptive method fails, to prevent an unwanted pregnancy.
- There are three different forms of EC: over the counter medication, prescription medication, and certain IUDs.
- Over the counter (Plan B) and prescription (Ella) ECs prevent the body from ovulating. Taking it literally prevents you from being able to get pregnant. IUDs prevent fertilization and implantation. This is NOT an abortion. Restrictions on abortion do not impact access to EC.

Where can I get it?

- Plan B: at any pharmacy. You may be able to get it off the shelf, you may have to ask the pharmacist for it.
- Ella: via prescription from your provider.
- IUD: via a consult and insertion from your provider.

When can I use it?

 All EC methods are effective up to 120 hours, or about 5 days, after having unprotected sex.

Who can use it?

- All EC methods are safe and effective to use for people capable of getting pregnant, no matter your age.
- Plan B is most effective for people under 165 pounds, Ella is most effective for people under 195 pounds, and IUDs are effective for people of all sizes. No matter your body size, there is an effective EC method for you.

What is it?

- Medication abortion uses two medications to end a pregnancy: mifepristone and misoprostol.
- Mifepristone stops hormones from going to the pregnancy. Misoprostol causes cramping and bleeding to pass the pregnancy.
- Mifepristone is taken first by mouth. 1-2 days later, misoprostol is either taken buccally (by dissolving in the space between the cheeks and the gums) or vaginally.
- Because these medications end an existing pregnancy, this is an abortion.

Where can I get it?

 Via telehealth or in clinic visit with your health care provider who offers abortion care. Access will vary dependent on where you live.

When can I use it?

 In medical settings, medication abortion is used up to 11 weeks of pregnancy.

Who can use it?

- With access, resources, and support, medication abortion is safe and effective for anyone who needs it. People who selfmanage their abortions with pills can do so safely. The real threat is criminalization.
- No matter your age, no matter your weight, this is a safe and effective method of abortion up to 11 weeks.
